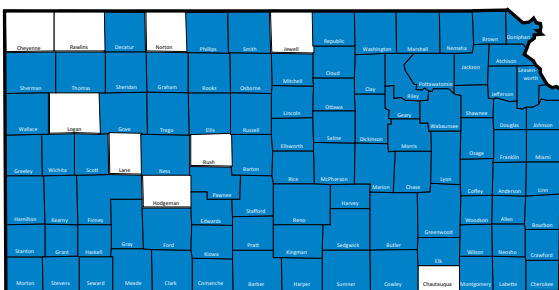

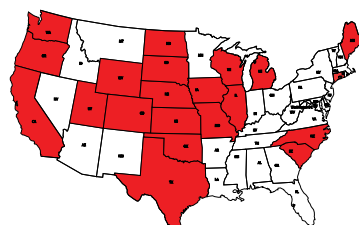

As established by law, half of the FSTC member terms expired June 30, 2010 and were due to be reappointed or replaced. Of the six members whose terms expired, Kathy Elkins, Larry Pander and Rodney Redinger were reappointed. The

Board of EMS appointment is still pending, and three new members were appointed. Brenda McNorton was appointed to represent the Kansas State Fire Marshal's Office, Mark Sweany was appointed to represent the Kansas Fire Marshals Association and Kevin Flory was appointed to represent the Kansas State Firefighters Association.

Leaving the FSTC were Andy Moffitt (KSFFA), Karl McNorton (KSFMO) and John Mattox (KFMA). The FSTC extends our appreciation to these professionals for their service to the Kansas fire service. A special acknowledgement of John Mattox's service is warranted. John served on the FSTC from its inception in 2002 and was one of only three remaining members from that "charter" group.

The Fire Service Training Commission remains a critical element in bringing training to the Kansas fire service. The guidance and oversight provided by the commission helps insure that training is made available to any fire department requesting service.

2010 PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Introduction

The Kansas Fire & Rescue Training Institute has continued to deliver quality training while improving and expanding programs in FY 2010. A process of continual improvement begun in FY 2002 has extended into FY 2010 and will continue into the future by expanding our programs to keep up with the ever-expanding mission of the fire service. The Institute plans to continue the improvement and expansion of programs into the coming year and beyond.

This report provides an overview of activities and accomplishments of FY 2010.

Instructional Program Improvements and Accomplishments

In March 2010, the Kansas Fire & Rescue Training Institute underwent a reaccreditation site visit by the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress (IFSAC). Accreditation from IFSAC authorizes the Institute to award national certifications for 17 levels within 9 fire service disciplines. Due every five years, reaccreditation site visits review policies, procedures, testing materials and operating practices used in the certification process. The Institute was reaccredited as a result of this review and was praised by the site team for the condition of the program and the practices used within the process. The Institute maintains accreditation from two accrediting bodies. The National Board of Professional Qualifications site visit is due in FY 2011.

In the spring of 2010, the Institute conducted a thorough review of all programs that lead to national certification. This review was conducted by committees made up of representatives from the fire service and included instructors, fire chiefs, former students and Institute staff. The intent of this review was to identify ways to improve student success and the processes used within these courses. A number of issues were identified that impact delivery of this training and the success of students. An in-depth report was prepared for the Fire Service Training Commission, and an action plan was created for making improvements. Action items included short- and long-term goals.

Needed improvements identified in the review included student understanding of instructional and certification requirements across many levels. Also identified were improvements in instructional design. In an effort to better inform potential students of the requirements and rigors of courses, the Institute created an electronic newsletter specifically designed to educate the fire service about the requirements of national standards and the courses leading to national certification. Titled ClearText, this newsletter is designed to be a one- or two-page, straight-to-the-point document that covers a single topic per issue.

Revision of courses is also underway. Many other actions have been initiated and are underway as a response to the study. Some actions have already been completed, while others will extend into the future. The outcomes of this effort are expected to begin improving the process and increase the success rate for national certification testing.

A new course titled "Surface Water Rescue" was pilot-tested in the spring of 2010. This course is designed to meet the professional qualifications of the National Fire Protection Association's (NFPA) Technical Rescue Technician standard for surface water rescue. The course will help prepare Kansas firefighters to conduct rescues during floods and other rescues in the water. Full implementation is expected in the fall of 2010 and spring 2011.

Fire Service Instructor II was redeveloped and implemented during FY 2010. This course enhances the basic Instructor I course taught by the Institute. This course focuses on course and lesson development. The Institute had curriculum for this course, but it was in need of redevelopment. Instructors will be able to improve their instructional skills and credentials through this course.

Equipment and Infrastructure Improvements

Infrastructure improvements were limited to relatively small items during FY 2010. Due to our funding level, our practice is to accumulate funds over a period of years in order to make major improvements. In FY 2009, the Institute purchased the Flammable Liquids and Gases Firefighting Simulator. That purchase depleted our program improvement funds and put the Institute back into the saving mode for the next purchase.

Although improvement funds were limited, a few improvements were planned and accomplished. A $\frac{3}{4}$ ton pickup was purchased to tow the many small trailers operated in support of training classes. This pickup replaced a $\frac{1}{2}$ ton pickup that simply wasn't capable of towing the trailers in use today.

An additional 14' trailer was purchased to house equipment used in the trench rescue course offered by the Institute. An existing trailer was repurposed to store and transport equipment used in the new surface water rescue course.

A SCBA mask fit testing machine was made available to the Institute by the Kansas State Fire Marshal's Office. This machine will enable the Institute to switch from qualitative fit testing to quantitative as required by professional standards. Although not required by OSHA, quantitative fit testing is required by NFPA standards and is recognized as the preferred method for fit testing by the fire service.

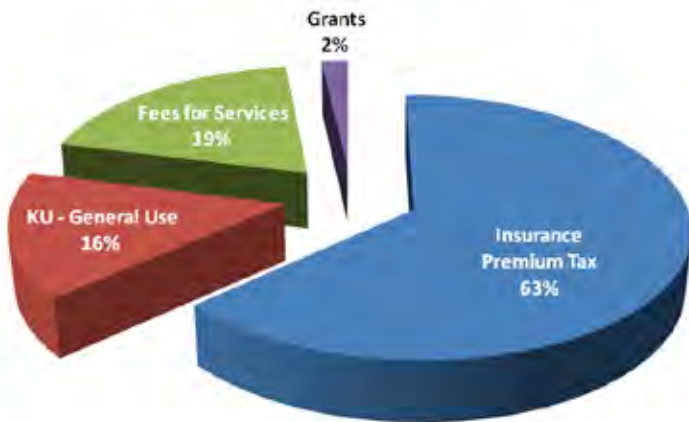
A search camera was made available for our technical rescue program by the Kansas Adjutant General through homeland security funding. The camera is designed to be used in confined spaces and provides views of areas not easily accessed. The camera will be housed with the Lawrence-Douglas County Fire Medical so it will be available for use

in emergencies. The Institute will use the camera for training and then return it to Lawrence/Douglas County as part of their rescue team equipment.

Fiscal Matters and Policies

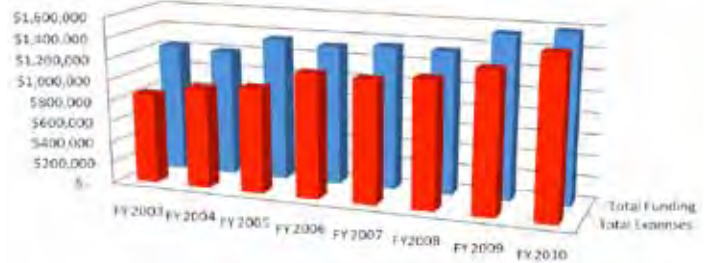
The Institute has been able to minimize the impact of the economy on its programs. All requests for training continue to be honored. During the 2010 legislative session, an adjustment to the administrative fees paid to the Kansas Department of Administration was made by the Legislature. The change distributed the fee to the Board of EMS, the Fire Marshal's Office and the Kansas Fire & Rescue Training Institute. Prior to this change, the administrative fees were all paid by the Fire Marshal's Office. The effect of this change was that the Institute's funding will be reduced by \$32,000. The Institute testified in favor of this action. While no organization wishes to lose funding, we felt the action was a fair distribution of the fees.

The Institute will work very hard to minimize the impact of this reduction on training and services to the Kansas fire service. The future will measure what that impact will be. If funding continues to be stable, the impact will be minimal.

Funding vs. Expenses



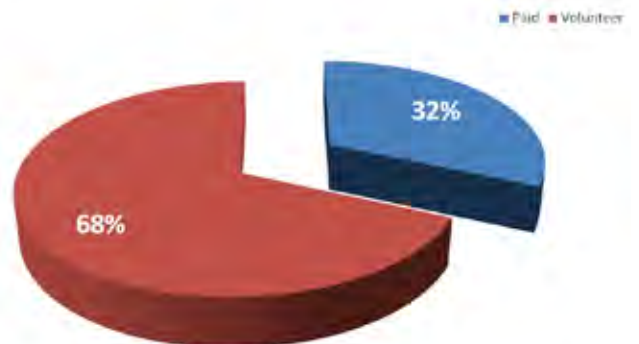
From the inception of new funding in FY 2003, the Institute has been able to improve the infrastructure used to deliver training throughout Kansas while honoring all training requests. As training demands have increased, the ability to continue funding infrastructure improvements has diminished. Honoring training requests will continue to be the Institute's top priority as we move into the future. As expenses outrun funding growth, our ability to fund new training props will shrink. Over the short-term, this will not create significant problems; however, as existing props age and need to be replaced, special funds may need to be requested.

Overall, the Institute continues to be in good financial health. Careful management of our resources and funding has enabled us to continue providing quality training for all Kansas fire departments.

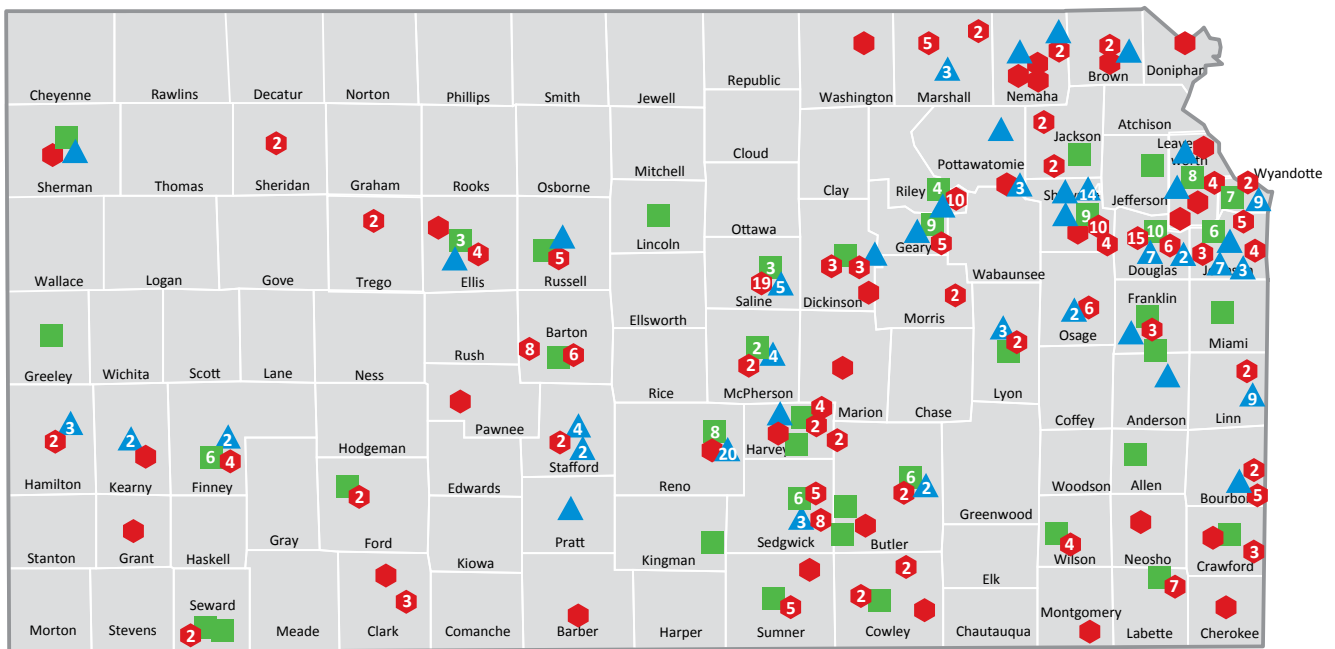
