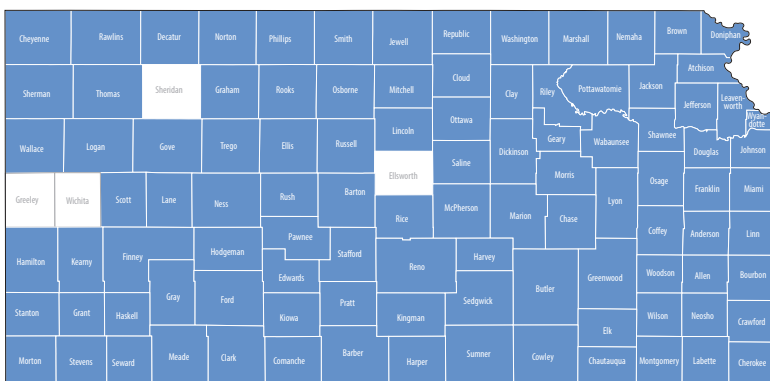

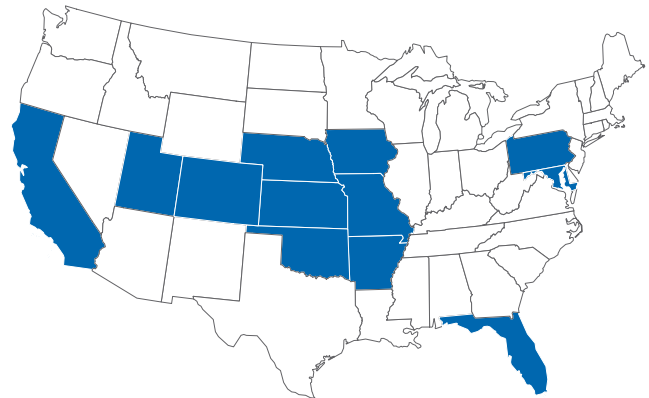

2013 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Grain Engulfment Rescue Training

FY 2013 brought the first year of Grain Engulfment Rescue training. The semi-trailer designed to support the initiative was delivered in late 2012, with train-the-trainers beginning early in FY 2013. \$90,000 funding for this trailer was provided through a donation from the Kansas Grain & Feed Association, the Kansas Cooperative Council and the Kansas Farmers Service Association. The program began "end-user" training classes August 1, 2012, and is continuing to be delivered today. In the first year of operation, 103 Grain Engulfment Rescue courses were delivered in 68 communities. 1,948 firefighters and grain facility workers from 57 Kansas counties attended these courses.

The program's success had an exclamation point added to it in February 2013, with a successful rescue in Bern, Kan. A worker was engulfed inside a grain bin and was successfully rescued. Rescuers included facility employees and firefighters from the surrounding area. Many of the rescuers attended Grain Engulfment Rescue training a few weeks prior to the incident. Responders attributed the training provided through this program as a significant contribution to the success of this rescue.

It is unknown how many other workers have prevented accidents armed with the information from the courses they have attended. However, just one successful rescue proves the value of this program.

Firefighter Skills Training

Late in FY 2012, a new Firefighter Skills trainer (trailer) was ordered to enhance the Institute's ability to provide skills training for Kansas firefighters. Prior to the delivery of this unit, our ability to provide hands-on training for those destructive skills were very limited. Skills such as forcible entry, ventilation, breaking glass, sprinkler system operations, breaching walls and ceilings and many other skills cannot be performed on existing buildings without causing extensive damage. This unit allows firefighters to practice these critical skills in a "real-world" environment without damaging existing buildings.

The Firefighter Skills trailer was delivered early in FY 2013. Work began immediately with train-the-trainers. "End-user" training followed immediately. In the first three months of this curriculum (and trailer), 16 courses had been scheduled. We anticipate that as word spreads, the course will be delivered between 50 and 75 times in FY 2014.

Designed to accommodate up to 30 firefighters in a single class, this valuable training tool will enhance training and skills development

for all who attend the course. Fire departments wishing to host a Firefighter Skills training class may contact the Institute to get on the training schedule.

Online Instructor I Course

Development and implementation of the new Online Instructor I course was completed in time to begin delivery January 1, 2013. This course is unique in that a published text book is not required, saving the firefighter the cost of purchasing the manual. Through a copyright agreement with the publisher, the Fire Service Instructor I content from the referenced text was placed online and formatted to include numerous activities and reinforcements for learning. The course features include downloadable MP3 audio recordings of the assigned readings, which class participants may conveniently play while scanning the text or

viewing the course presentation slides. For those firefighters who prefer it, the text can be read by the student at their own speed as well. Activities included in the course are specifically designed to reinforce the learning objectives. Those objectives form the basis for the National Certification testing process available for firefighters wishing to take the certification exam at the end of the course.

Online Instructor I is part one of a "blended course." Upon completing part one, the student enrolls in a two-day face-to-face seminar that completes the course. This seminar

includes practice presentations and reinforces the skills-related material from the online portion of the course. Upon completion of part two, students have the option of taking the National Professional Certification exam for Fire Service Instructor 1. To date, 137 firefighters have enrolled in or completed this course. The majority of the students have chosen to take the certification exam. Of those taking the exam after completing the online course, 100 percent have passed the exam and been certified as a Fire Service Instructor I.

Equipment and Infrastructure

Firefighter Skills Trainer

As described in the 2013 Program Highlights section of this report, the Institute took delivery of the new Fire Fighter Skills trainer in the spring of 2013. This unit represents a substantial investment in the Institute's ability to provide "real-life" training experiences for Kansas firefighters. The unit cost \$273,000, with an additional \$30,000 invested in tools and equipment necessary to conduct the training. Every training delivery requires the use of multiple sheets of plywood (oriented strand board—OSB), sheetrock and glass panels in order to provide the realistic training that this trailer promises.



The Firefighter Skills Trainer features training for multiple skills that would be too destructive for practice on a normally occupied building. Forcing doors and windows, breaching roofs, walls and doors, operating sprinkler systems and many more skills are taught utilizing this trainer.

Semi-Tractor

At the end of FY 2013, the Institute received the newest edition to our fleet of trucks and trailers. This new addition was a Freightliner Business Class Truck. While the truck bears the Business Class designation, it is fully capable of towing any trailer in the Institute's inventory. This truck was purchased to replace the Freightliner FL70 Business Class truck owned by the Institute. This change was necessitated by the fact that, as the Institute acquired more training units, the FL70 was not capable of towing the larger trailers purchased since 2003 (when the FL70 was purchased). The new semi-tractor will be able to tow any trailer the Institute owns or plans to purchase in the foreseeable future.

Future Infrastructure Plans

Normally, funding for substantial purchases like those listed above require saving money over multiple years. In FY 2003, the Institute received new funding that we enjoy to this day. When we received the new funding, the Institute staff met and created a list of training props and infrastructure improvements. It was an extensive list that would enable us to support many of the basic training need of the fire service. With the purchase of the Firefighter Skills trailer, the original list created in 2003 was completed.

Since that time, the fire service mission has expanded to include

many new subject areas. In addition to the new services accepted by fire departments throughout Kansas, we have not yet addressed many intermediate or advanced levels of training needed. The first improvement made was purchasing the Live Firefighting Simulator. That simulator is now 11 years old and has endured thousands of training fires. Plans are underway to refurbish the trailer in order to extend its life another 10 years.

Current plans are to purchase an additional heavy-duty pickup to tow smaller trailers. The single pickup owned by the Institute is currently

used to tow four different trailers and cannot keep up with the multiple uses. This addition to the fleet will expand our ability to support multiple courses simultaneously.

The Institute is currently creating our list of additional training resources that are needed to improve the training experience for Kansas firefighters. The Institute always welcomes input and feedback from the fire service on training needs and props that would enhance or expand the programs that we offer. FISCAL MATTERS

Total funding provided to the Institute through Fire Insurance Premium Taxes in FY 2012 was \$1,046,320.65. Total Insurance Premium Tax funding for FY 2013 was \$1,122,458.86, a modest increase of \$76,138.21. However, expenses for delivering training increased \$96,758.80 over FY 2012. These increases are attributed to the growth in the total number of training classes delivered in FY2013 (84 more classes) and the associated costs of those activities. Those costs included instructor wages, expenses, transporting training trailers in association with those classes, the increased costs of fuel and other costs of operating a training organization.

The modest growth of Insurance Premium Tax revenue since FY 2005 (the year KF&RTI began receiving these funds) has served to offset inflationary growth in expenses. However, program expansion to meet increasing demands and training needs has been limited by the marginal growth in revenue.

The University of Kansas Provost's Office provided additional funding of \$242,434. A grant of \$24,000 was received from the National Fire Academy/Federal Emergency Management Agency (NFA/FEMA) to

support the delivery of National Fire Academy authorized programs with the Institute. NFA funding was down \$2,000 in FY 2013 and has been further reduced to \$22,000 for FY 2014.

During this challenging year, the Institute was able to continue improving programs by finalizing the purchase of the Firefighter Skills trainer and the replacement of the oldest of our Business Class semi-trucks. Funding for these purchases was provided through a savings program from our Generated Revenue account and our Fire Insurance Premium Tax funding. Funds not required for operational expenses have been saved over multiple years to fund these types of purchases. This process has allowed the Institute to purchase many of the training props used in our programs. Without this practice, the Institute would have been forced to return to the legislature to request special funding for these purchases.

Given the history of the marginal increases in Fire Insurance Premium Tax revenues over the years, future purchases will require a longer time to save money for major purchases. Residual funds from both the generated income resource and the Insurance Tax are expected to hover

around \$100,000 in FY 2014. Given the costs of semi-trucks and semi-trailer mounted training props, it will take three to five years to accumulate enough funds to make new or replacement purchases in the future. As operating costs increase, residual funds will shrink further and extend the time necessary to save for large purchases required to maintain state-of-the-art training resources.

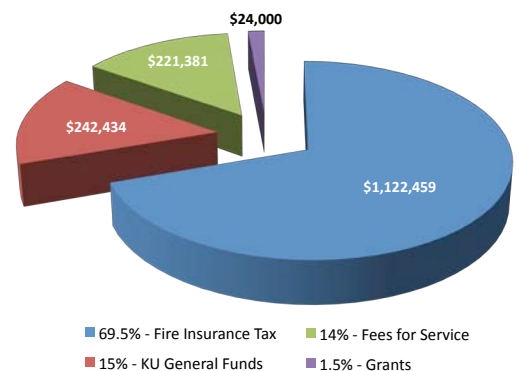
Actions have been taken to limit operating costs within the Institute. However, actions that don't affect training deliveries are limited. As operating costs increase and funding growth lags behind, the Institute's ability to honor all training requests becomes threatened. If this trend continues (without an increase in funding), additional cost-cutting measures will be forced to include a reduction in training and services. It is difficult to forecast the exact time this action may be required. Current patterns of expenses and funding growth suggest that training and services may be negatively impacted within the next two to three years. The Fire Service Training Commission is beginning to formulate a plan to approach the legislature for additional funding. Contact your Commission representative for more detailed information.

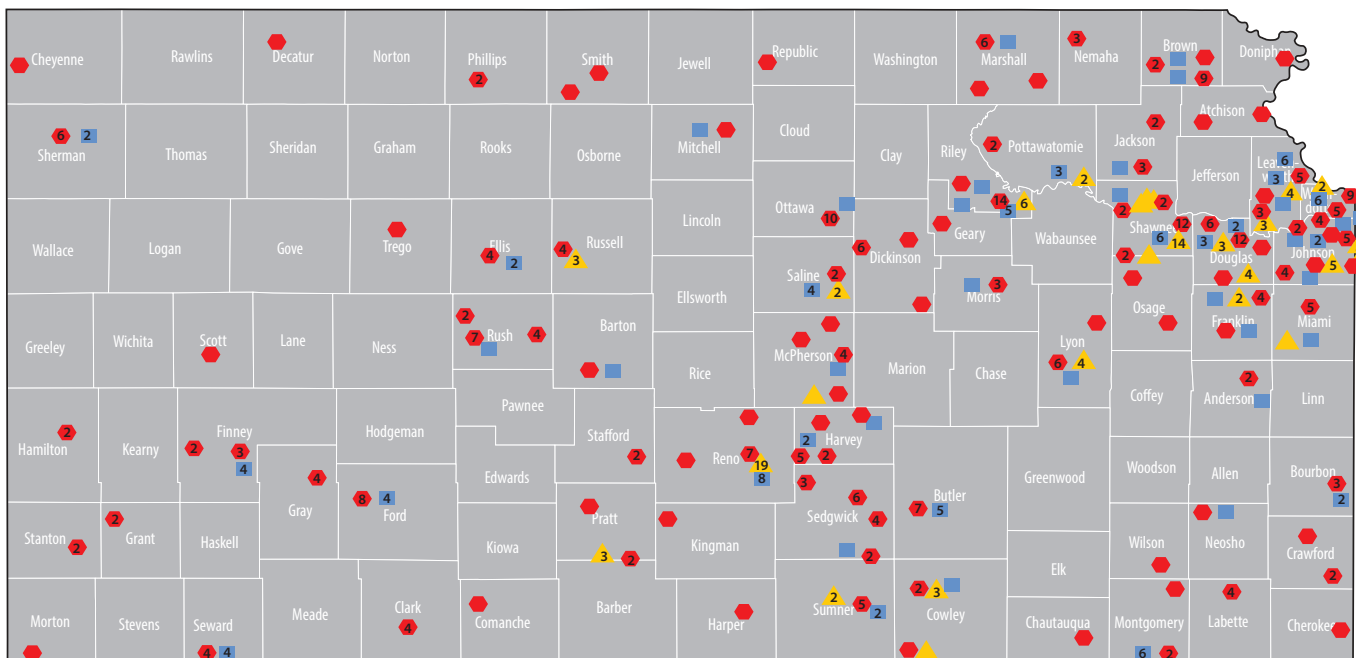
